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NASCA Start

The National Aboriginal Sporting Chance Academy (NASCA) has started at our school this week. Marcia Bill will be our school's NASCA coordinator and will be working with our High School girls in a mentoring capacity in this role. NASCA empower Aboriginal young people to: Improve school attendance and ultimately school performance, Develop specific career pathways and work-ready skills, Strengthen cultural pride and Identity, Build life skills, personal development and long-term resilience.

An official information session for parents and students will be scheduled as soon as it is safe to travel to Brewarrina for the staff of NASCA. I'm sure you will be looking forward to working in partnership with NASCA to provide wonderful opportunities and experiences for your child.

High School Expectations

I have had the pleasure of joining in with the High School student/staff meetings and it is great to see many students receiving awards and prizes for their appropriate behaviour and positive work attitudes.

Mobile Phones

Currently, the high school staff are closely focusing on eliminating phone misuse in the classroom. If a child is using a phone in the classroom environment, they will receive a warning. If repeated warnings are given, your child will receive a formal caution about inappropriate behaviour. Please encourage your child to leave their phone at home, or indeed, if they need to bring it to school, to not be using it during school time.

Leaving School grounds without permission

The high school staff are also focusing on ensuring students remain in class and in the school grounds. Our canteen is providing a free recess and free lunch options, so there is not a need for a child to leave the school grounds to get food. Other food items are also available for sale in the canteen. Students are required to sign out of school if they leave the school grounds and will be marked as absent until they return. Please encourage your children to remain at school during school hours.

<u>New Behaviour Strategy introduced by</u> <u>the NSW Department of Education</u>

Our Student Behaviour Strategy helps build an inclusive education system where every student is known, valued and cared for, and all students can learn to their fullest ability. We know that students who feel supported and safe are more likely to be more connected to school and active participants in their learning.

Positive and respectful learning environments promote wellbeing, engagement and improved academic achievement. The Strategy supports a preventative, positive, student-centred, schoolfamily-community approach in which consistency is key. The needs of all students will be met by a care continuum.

What is a formal caution for a behaviour of concern?

A behaviour of concern is something someone does that might cause or has caused harm or danger to themselves or others. A formal caution tells a student that their behaviour caused or may cause harm or danger to themselves and other people. It is designed to let you and your child know that their behaviour needs to improve.

A formal caution is a letter in which your child's behaviour of concern has been recorded. Your child will not be suspended at this time.

Flood Warnings

Due to severe weather warnings in our area we remind our communities to please stay safe. Never enter floodwater. If it's flooded, forget it!

The major cause of death during floods is from people entering or travelling through floodwater. This includes driving, riding and walking through floodwater and children playing in floodwater.

Floodwater may be deeper or faster flowing than it appears and can contain hidden debris.

Consider the following during periods of significant rain or flood:

Drive safely – don't feel pressured by vehicles behind you or your passengers to cross a flooded road. Even emergency services will only enter the water as a last resort.

Realise your best plan may to be to avoid travel altogether. Sometimes your only option will be to wait it out.

At all times, make sure your phone is charged and a charger is available in the car or at work. In a life-threatening emergency, call 000 (triple zero).

A 'road closed' or a 'road flooded' sign means that road is unsafe to travel on. Find alternate ways which are free from floodwater or wait until the 'all clear' is given for that road. It is safer to turn around than to enter floodwater.

Dear Year 8 Parent or Carer

The Validation of Assessment for Learning & Individual Development (VALID) test for Year 8 students will be held between Monday 24 October and Friday 4 November 2022. The test takes approximately 75 minutes. The VALID Science 8 test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer.

VALID Science 8 contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW Science Years 7–10 Syllabus (2018). Students will be tested on their:

- knowledge and understanding of science
- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes, and values aboutscience.

VALID Science 8 contains audio, so each student needs to bring suitable headphones or earbuds that connect to a device. Schools will indicate if students need their own device.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1, 2023. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personalised electronic report describing the knowledge and skills demonstrated by your child in the test will be available from their school. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test across NSW.

The principal of your child's school can provide you with more details about the VALID program if you require additional information.

Reading, writing and numeracy skills for everyday life

The HSC minimum standard has been introduced to ensure students have the reading, writing and numeracy skills needed for everyday life, work and further study.

What this means for students

Students need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show they meet this standard, students need to achieve Level 3 in short online reading, writing and numeracy tests. Schools will help students to decide when they are ready to take each test. Students get four chances a year to sit each test, from Year 10 up to five years after starting their first HSC course.

Only students who meet the HSC minimum standard will receive an HSC testamur.

Provisions and exemptions

Students do not need to meet the HSC minimum standard to:

- study HSC courses
- sit HSC exams
- receive HSC assessment and exam results
- receive an ATAR
- receive a Record of School Achievement.

Provisions are available for some students with disability. Some students with a disability studying Life Skills courses may also be exempt from meeting the minimum standard to receive their HSC testamur.





Year 7 English

Congratulations to our Year 7 students on finishing a very busy Term 3. The class created a magazine with every student choosing a report or article they wanted to research, write and submit. This term is off to a busy start again with tutoring continuing for some students and our new unit of poetry followed by a film study. I am already impressed with some of the poems created and the way the class is analysing and deconstructing different forms of poetry including Cinquain, Free verse and Haiku. It has been an adjustment coming from primary school, but I am proud of the way the students that have stepped up and are participating in their learning every day. Below are some Extended Cinquain poems that they created earlier this week.

This week I have sent home a homework booklet with the students, each week there is a reading and comprehension task they are to complete and return for marking. We are working on building their confidence to read aloud and understand what they have read. If you have any spare time to listen to them read that would be a big help. As a school we have been focusing on building our students vocabulary knowledge. As part of that we have a word of the week, which we explore and use in our writing to help build our knowledge of meaningful words in different contexts.

Check-in assessment- Term 4

Check-in assessments are online assessment for students in Years 3 to 9. They are mapped to the NSW Syllabuses and National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions. There are two assessments:

1.Reading

2.Numeracy

Each assessment consists of between 40 to 50 multiple choice questions.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.
