Yaama! I would like to give a warm welcome back to all of our students and their families to start the 2023 school year. I hope your children are well rested and enthusiastic about starting the school year in new grades, with some students getting new teachers!

"New" is the theme for this week and beyond at Brewarrina Central School at the moment.

NEW STUDENTS

We had our new Kindergarten enrolments start Tuesday of Week 3, and their first day of big school seemed to go really well. The ease that they settled in to class and the routines of school was lovely to see.

We have a new Year 7 cohort with many of our Year 6 students returning and the addition of several students from Weilmoringle and St Patricks schools making for a nice cohort of students in their first year of high school.

Welcome to our new enrolments who have also started this week. We have the addition of a few new and returning families which we are excited to see engage in our school.

NEW EDUCATORS

We have new teachers and educators starting in different roles this year.

I would like to welcome Miss Madeleine Challender to the permanent position of Visual Arts in the High School. Madeleine was previously teaching at Redbend College in Forbes. Madeleine is a welcome addition to our teaching staff, and I am sure her creative talent and enthusiasm for Visual Arts will positively influence our student cohort.

NEW INFRASTRUCTURE

One of the major physical changes to our school to start the year, is the addition of new automated gates at the front of the school and at the Belmore St carpark entrance. When fully operational, staff will access entry via swipe card and visitors or late arrival students will need to use the intercom to communicate with the office, who will open the gates from the office area. There are also over 20 new CCTV cameras that have been installed in the school to upgrade our security.

Many new air conditioners have been installed in classrooms and common areas and they have been a welcome relief for students and staff at the moment.

On behalf of the Secondary Department, welcome back to a new school year!

Welcome to Ms Challender, who joins a fantastic Secondary team this year that is highly motivated to ensure quality teaching and learning. It is great to be working with our class SLSOs, NASCA and Clontarf- our students have all the tools and support to help them succeed. The staff have all been impressed with the lovely settled start to the term as students are respectful to staff and each other, remain in class, and give their best efforts- I must say I am really loving the vibe at the moment.

Book packs are available for students who need them. Many of our students were very well prepared on the first day of school. It is also expected that students have a backpack. This is a necessary part of high school life, as students need to keep track of all of their belongings and bringing a backpack to school shows they are ready to learn. A reminder that if students bring their phone to school, it must be in the yondr pouch all day. When there are no phones in the classroom, it reduces distraction and students can focus on what they come to school for- to learn. I have included in the newsletter the process for students that do not follow this expectation. It was met with much success last year, and a notable drop in referrals for misuse of mobile phone. Thankyou to parents for your support. There have been no issues with phones so far this term.

School uniform can also be purchased from the Front Office. All Secondary students are expected to wear uniform. We have lovely new school shirts- all students receive the first one free, then additional shirts can be purchased for \$35 each. The white polos can still be worn as uniform. Shorts need to be black or navy. Short shorts are not accepted as appropriate uniform for school. Clontarf shirts are also part of our uniform and students are encouraged to wear them with pride. With so many options, there is

no reason for wearing shirts that are not uniform, and students that do not follow the expectation will be followed up. A reminder that students must wear closed in shoes to schooljoggers or canvas shoes are fine. Slide thongs, rubber thongs and sandals are not permitted at school.

Secondary Regional Swimming representatives-Congratulations to Deaken Boney, Cameron Fox and Riley Higgins who have qualified for the Regional Swimming in Dubbo in Week 7. We are very proud of your efforts and wish you the best of luck.

We have a very successful positive reinforcement system in Secondary, as shown by the number of students that consistently earn merits and other positive recognition. It is preferred for parents who are picking up their children to park their cars on Young Street, to limit the traffic and stop children walking onto the road.

There are several options for keeping phones, airpods etc safe

- Keep them at home
- 2. If bought to school, keep in a Yondr pouch OR in a bag during class time

What happens when the expectation is not followed in the classroom?

Teacher to give visual warning in class (je name on board). Student to be given 3 warnings in class to follow the school expectation

If student follows this expectation, no further action required



3 warnings and student continues to NOT follow expectation

Referral to Executive

Executive to discuss with student

Executive to contact parent/carer

If student follows this expectation, no further action required

2 or more referrals within a week



Formal Caution (Warning of Suspension)

Discussion with student- supports in place if necessary

Parent/carer contact

Student continues to NOT follow expectations



2nd Formal Caution (Warning of Suspension)
